Glenda Greenwald attended Smith College and later earned her bachelor's degree from Wayne State University in 1960 and a master's degree in 1963. She has completed all course work toward a Ph.D. in Mass Communications at the Sorbonne University in Paris, France.

Greenwald is president and founder of the "WISH List," a national network supporting women candidates for high state and national elective offices. She is also director of the Greenwald Foundation's "I Have A Dream" program which offers fifty low-income students in St. Louis a seven-year program ending in a four-year paid college tuition.

Greenwald is member of several boards, including the National Association of Female Executives; Girls, Inc.; and the Michigan Women's Foundation. She was named Woman of the Year in 1989 and received the Women in Community Award. She speaks fluent Spanish, Portuguese, and French and has lived in Venezuela, Brazil, Argentina, France, and England. She is a sought after speaker who addressed the audience at the Global Women's Summit in Taiwan in 1994 and served as a delegate for the United Nation's World Women's Conference in Beijing, 1995.
